#### On the Senate/House Agenda

The House and Senate are set to return to session on January 3 to open the second half of the 2005-06 legislative session. Here's a rundown of what we know about the House Calendar. The Senate has not yet published their calendar.

The House Calendar includes— <u>House Bill 2067</u> setting limits on state spending through a constitutional amendment; <u>House Bill 1902</u> eliminating the sunset date on the \$2/ton Recycling Fee and requiring Recycling Performance Grants to be used for local recycling and waste reduction efforts; and <u>Senate Bill 881</u> and <u>Senate Bill 897</u> making changes to the Eminent Domain Code in response to *Kelo*.

# House Committee Sets Meetings on Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Energy Policy

The House Environmental Resources and Energy Committee has set the next Energy Policy informational meeting for January 25 and a meeting January 11 to discuss greenhouse gas emissions and climate change.

The January 11 meeting will be held at the Springfield Township Building in Delaware County and will feature a presentation by Dr. Richard Alley of Penn State University on the science of climate change, Dr. Adam Rose, also from Penn State, on state responses to greenhouse gas emissions and Ms. Joy Bergey of the Pennsylvania Interfaith Climate Change Campaign.

The January 24 Energy Policy informational meeting agenda includes Dr. Alan Scaroni, Director of the Energy Institute at Penn State University regarding energy research and development, Rosemary McAvoy of the Renewable Energies Council discussing alternative fuels and Christopher Lynch, Director, Environmental Management Services of the Small Business Development Center at the Wharton School regarding energy efficiency in small businesses.

The House Committee is chaired by Rep. Bill Adolph (R-Delaware) and Rep. Bud George (D-Clearfield).

#### Recycling in PA Tops 4.8 Million Tons, Saving Materials Valued at \$113 Million



The Department of Environmental Protection this week reported Pennsylvanians recycled over 4.8 million tons of municipal waste in 2004 avoiding over \$259 million in disposal costs in the process. In 2003, counties reported recycling 4.4 million tons.

The materials collected were valued at more than \$113 million. Other calculated benefits include:

- **Energy Savings:** almost 66 trillion British thermal units (BTUs) of energy, enough to power 643,000 homes for one year in Pennsylvania or the equivalent of conserving 531 million gallons of gasoline;
- Air Pollution/Climate Change Gas Reduction: eliminated more than 2.5 million metric tons of air emissions, including greenhouse gas emission reductions of 1.9 million metric tons of carbon equivalent --- a savings of approximately 2.4 percent of all greenhouse gas emissions. Part of the air emissions savings total was 7,731 metric tons of sulfur oxides, an important ingredient in acid rain formation. Nitrogen oxides, a precursor to smog, were reduced by 8,814 metric tons, an amount equal to 5.5 percent of these emissions from Pennsylvania electrical utilities;
- Water Pollution Reduction: nearly 9,000 metric tons;
- **Raw Materials:** by recycling more than 1 million tons of steel cans, appliances and similar materials, Pennsylvania industries saved almost 1.3 million tons of iron ore, 718,460 tons of coal and 61,582 tons of limestone; and
- **Paper:** Through recycling newspapers, office and mixed paper, the state saved the equivalent of 8.2 million trees. On average, a live tree removes 60 pounds per year of air pollution from the environment.

## New Video Explains Composition of PA Waste, How Much Could Be Recycled

#### **Grants Available for Historic Preservation Programs**

The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission is accepting applications for 2006 <u>Historic Preservation Certified Local Government Grants</u> which help teach people about ways to preserve local history. Applications are due January 13.

Grant money can be used to evaluate a municipality's historic and archaeological resources; to prepare nominations for the National Register of Historic Places; to develop documentation to designate additional municipal historic districts or to enlarge a previously designated municipal historic district; to offer historic preservation training for Certified Local Government review board or commission members and staff; to develop and publish brochures or educational materials that explain municipal historic preservation responsibilities, activities, programs or local regulatory procedures; and to develop a municipal historic preservation plan.

Certified local governments can apply for grants in the following categories: Cultural Resource Survey; National Register Nominations; Technical and Planning Assistance; Educational and Interpretative Programs; Staffing and Training; and Pooling and Third Party Administration.

To be considered, projects should take place between August 1, 2006, and July 31, 2007.

To be certified, local governments must maintain a historic preservation commission, survey local historic properties, enforce local preservation laws and satisfy other qualifications. #### High Performance "Green School" Grants Available

The Governor's Green Government Council announced schools can apply for a <u>High-Performance Green Schools Planning Grant</u> to help defray the cost of complying with LEED green building design standards. Grants will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis.

The grants are funded by the State Public School Building Authority and jointly administered by the Governor's Green Government Council and the Department of Education.

Eligible costs include building energy simulations and daylight modeling, green coaches and specialty consultant fees, design fees for additional services beyond those

conventionally covered, and help with LEED-NC certification costs. The funds are not available for research, materials, or construction costs.

Projects that fail to obtain at least LEED-NC Silver certification within one year of building acceptance will be required to repay grant funds to the Department of Education.

# Fred Rogers Learning, Media Center to be Green Building

Saint Vincent College officials announced Davis Gardner Gannon Pope Architecture (DGGP) of Pittsburgh has been selected as the architects for <u>The Fred M. Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media</u> and the new Saint Vincent College Conference Center and Exhibition Hall.

The "green" building will include a variety of design features for sustainability, and the College will apply for national Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification. These include super-insulated construction, daylight and natural ventilation, high-efficiency mechanical and electrical systems, storm water management on site and water conservation controls.

The entire facility will be outfitted with state-of-the-art technology for communications and presentation, including capabilities for video teleconferencing and multimedia displays.

Other elements of the overall facility include a display and storage area for the Foster and Muriel McCarl Coverlet Collection and a welcome area and a connection to existing walking trails and the adjacent Winnie Palmer Nature Reserve. Parking will be provided for 350 cars.

The firm has won numerous awards for its work including Top Ten Green Building Award 2005, a national award by the American Institute of Architects, a number of Honor Awards for the Pittsburgh Glass Center from the Pittsburgh Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, Project of the Year Award for 2001 from the Pittsburgh Chapter of the Commercial Builders Council, Energy Conservation Award 2000 from the Department of Environmental Protection and the Design Excellence Award 1996 from the National Association of Seniors Housing.

The building program will be funded by public and private sources. Funding commitments include \$5 million from the Pennsylvania Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program, \$5 million for the Business/Conference Center from the Richard King Mellon Foundation and \$1 million from the Heinz Endowments.

It is expected that site design will get underway in January 2006. Construction is scheduled to commence in June 2006 and be completed by January 2008.

# January 11 Forum to Examine Energy Supplies and Technology in Pittsburgh

# Farm Show to Feature Special Renewable Fuels Display – January 7-14

Home grown energy sources from ethanol, soy-based biodiesel to corn-fired stoves will be on display at a special Pennsylvania Energy Harvest display area during the 90th Pennsylvania Farm Show January 7-14 in Harrisburg.

Pennsylvania Agriculture is not only comprised of production agriculture and related value added agribusinesses, but is also made up of those products that can serve to provide alternative energies to sustain Pennsylvania's vibrant economy.

This display will give visitors the opportunity to interact with individuals and companies who have developed or are in the process of developing sources or processes in this new and exciting field of renewable agricultural energy.

The inaugural meeting of the Governor's Renewable Agricultural Energy Council will be held January 3, ahead of the Farm Show, to lay out a work plan and goals for 2006.

#### Sustainable Agriculture Conference to be held February 2-4



The Pennsylvania Association of Sustainable Agriculture will hold its annual "<u>Farming for the Future Conference</u>" in State College February 2 to 4.

This year, PASA will offer six pre-conference "tracks" on Thursday. These sessions offer participants a chance to delve more deeply into special topics, and also to become better acquainted with other people of common interest.

Two tracks are intended to meet the needs of the fastest growing segments of the farm community, including many farmers of either

gender who did not grow up farming. Other pre-conference tracks this year include "The Link between Nutrition and Agriculture" (back by popular demand), "Pastured Poultry" (with help from the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy), "The Art of Country Living" and "The Art of Cheese."

Conference speakers include: Sandra Steingraber, noted biologist and author of Living Downstream, will open the conference Friday morning. Ag-economist-turned-activist John Ikerd will close the conference Saturday afternoon. Among other topics, Ikerd will discuss themes from his new book Sustainable Capitalism: A Matter of Common Sense. "

Brother David Andrews, executive director of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference of Des Moines, Iowa, will give a pre-conference presentation on Thursday evening titled, "Weaving a Diverse Landscape: Food as a Common Thread," with a discussion of the NCRLC's Eating is a Moral Act campaign.

Other workshops cover such farming interests as fruit and vegetable production, sustainable livestock, soil regeneration, conservation practices (including alternative energy systems) and federal farm policy initiatives, as well as a host of issues of interest to farmers and the non-farming public alike.

Examples of general interest sessions this year include "Towards Social Justice in Agriculture" and a panel to look at the issue of "Sacred Foods: The Critical Impact of Religion on Our Food Systems."

Special credit (0.6 CEU) is available to potential professional composters who participate in three sessions offered at this year's conference on Saturday by the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania. Participants in this program will also receive a complimentary copy of "The Practical Guide to Compost Marketing and Sales" by Ron Alexander.
